Plant America: Promoting Beautification, Conservation, & Education

OH DEER! Guess who's coming for dinner?

Many of us will concede that the deer on our island are cute and amusing. However, as gardeners, it is frustrating to try to peacefully coexist with creatures that seem to view yards and gardens as a never ending salad bar. I am still learning what grows here and what things I can do to out-wit the deer (apparently, not nearly enough!). Several large Sam's club-size containers of cayenne pepper have been sprinkled on the perimeter of my favorite plantings to discourage the grazing herds that visit like clockwork at dawn and dusk. This diabolical powdery welcome mat works reasonably well as an irritating border wall, until it rains.

Depsite certain plants being labeled as deer resistant the reality is that they will eat almost anything, if only a nibble to sample before rambling on to greener pastures. Driving around our neighborhood you see the standard shrubs and landscaping plants that are successful survivors and so used by most landscapers. These are classic and reliable but they can be a bit boring. The challenge is to add some color and contrast to our personal gardens that can survive and provide more interest throughout the year.

Starting with spring - hellebores, hyacinths and daffodils are wonderful underplantings for local shrubs. Those little pots of hyacinths and tea-a-tetes found at Walmart can go into colorful baskets in your house before they move into a permanent spot in the garden. Adding a Japanese Kerria or two to the yard will provide years of cheerful, yellow spring blooms that deer with admire but ignore. A rosemary hedge can define boundaries as well as a year-round tasty harvest as its snipped into shape. Rosemary is inexpensive, grows quickly and the piney scent is of no interest to deer.

Moving into summer, the addition of salvia, echinacea and milkweed will bring color, butterflies and hummingbirds. There is so much variety in these reliable plants that you're sure to find something to enjoy and complement your garden style. Lantana, although scorned by some, can provide exuberant pest free color and volume to the garden. Cleome adds height and whimsy and deer do not like its' mild thorny stems. Nicotiana will add additional height and scent from summer through fall.

Fall is the time I like to add moodier plants in an effort to pretend our coastal paradise has a real fall. Ornamental cabbage provides rich color that persists through winter. Sedums, fall grasses, Japanese anemones and seed pods create interest. Add in some new snapdragons for a fresh pop of color. A few strategically placed gourds from the farmers market shout out Autumn. And don't forget to plant bulbs in preparation for spring color.





Winter is a time to relax and enjoy seasonal greens. Prune sprigs of rosemary to tuck tuck into holiday arrangements and incorporate these into special food treats. The camellias start their blooming show and local hollies put on their winter display of colorful berries. Meanwhile our thoughts turn to the new year and renewed battle of the wits with the Skidaway deer...Oh Deer!

Community Beautification

Driving past the corner of Landings Way South and Westcross, at the "Westcross" sign, perhaps some of you felt as I did, that this area was neglected and in need of a makeover. As part of our club's efforts for continued beautification and conservation on our island, we have now partnered with The Landings Association to improve the look of this median where the Westcross sign is located. Our first task was a clean-up of the area where Garden Club members Karen Duncan, Dixie Diffenderfer, Pam Koger, Heidi Lieberman, and Pam Patterson volunteered their time.

Over the summer our goal is to develop a landscape scheme to present to Sean Burgess and the TLA for fall planting. We would love our members input for suggestions to beautify this area. Because there is no irrigation at this corner, the plantings will have to reflect a myriad of challenges and must be drought, shade and sun tolerant. They must also be deer proof, slow and low growing and preferably evergreen. Yes, this will be a challenge, but I'm sure through our club efforts we will develop an environmentally sound solution to beautify this location.

Hort Short Submitted by Meg Kettlitz

You have planted some Asclepias incarnata (swamp milkweed) in your garden in hopes of helping the Monarch butterfly. A few months later you are excited to see monarch caterpillars devouring your milkweed. But wait, there are also orange dots on the plant. Those orange dots are actually Aphis nerii (oleander aphids). In this case, it is best not to attempt to remove the aphids as you do not want to accidentally harm the caterpillar.



But if your milkweed does not have any eggs or caterpillars, the best remedy is to squish the aphids. Put on some disposable gloves and spend a few minutes smooshing as many as you can find. If there are too many to kill by hand, consider removing the plant completely. Do not throw this contaminated plant in your compost, but bag it and throw it away in your regular garbage. You may also try a spray of Dawn liquid detergent, alcohol, and water. When using this spray, you must be precise. It must hit the aphids and not the plants or mulch around affected plant. Once you have waited a few minutes for the "organic" pesticide to work, you must rinse it off of the plant. You do not want any monarch caterpillars eating this solution.

There are commercial pesticides but these are not recommended to be used on milkweed or any butterfly host plant. After all, what will kill one bug will also kill a caterpillar.
